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BREAKING CHEMISTRY

The 2022 Nobel Chemistry Prize goes to Carolyn Bertozzi, Morten Meldal and Barry Sharpless! Since 1901, only 186 chemists, seven of which are women, have received the Nobel Prize. Considering that 826 people have won Nobel prizes in the world, the scarcity of awards in the field of chemistry is astonishing. We start taking chemistry lessons at high school. We research chemistry which takes up a very large place in our lives with the experiments we do in the labs at our school and with our chemistry club.

I've received general information about our club and its activities from the founders of our club and our chemistry teachers Ümran Gedikli and Gülsüm Bayır. Each year, different themes are chosen and we de-

velop a project to participate in the History of Science Exhibition organized by St. Michel High School in cooperation with Marmara University.

This year's theme is "Remaking the experiments and models invented by French scientists who made important discoveries under the conditions of their time." With this study we will enable our students to experience the stages which the scientists have gone through before making an important discovery. We aim to present the experiments and models we have prepared in the exhibition in Istanbul's St. Michel High School. Another purpose is to design innovative and economic projects to protect the environment in order to participate in the competition organized by "Hack Ton Future" with high school students who take part in this organization with the contributions of "La French Tech Istanbul". In addition, we want to start projects in our school to raise the interest of our



students in chemistry by showing them that chemistry is in every area and everywhere in our lives.

Our club members also write articles in French and in English for the magazines published in our school. At the moment, we are carrying out a project perfume with the 9th grades. We have contacted <u>Man Perfumery</u> about this project. We will realize it 2nd semester. We are planning to make a trip to the Criminology Laboratory for the 2nd term. We are also planning to start a website where we can share our chemistry club work. We would like to invite guests from universities who can speak to us about chemistry. Actually it is our club members who guide our work. Their ideas help us expand and develop our work.



We asked club members to comment:

Ege Şen 9B: The topic our group is working on is the generation of energy from human waste. These go into a mechanism and are re-cycled, so we save energy. We didn't work on the functioning of the mechanism further but we decided to compensate the water energy we lost due to the flush in the toilets in this way.

Selen İnal 9A: Our project is to design a car wash system. We want to add a rain cover in this system to get enough water. The water passes through the gratings and is recycled in a system. So we can use it over and over again.

Doruk Karakoç 9D: We worked on how to improve the environment in the Ideathon competition that we participated in with our robot team. We developed projects about this topic which we have in common with the chemistry club.

Bora Abaslı 9A: We are working on a competition with the club. What we do is so enjyable. Our group is making a system that turns waste into energy. Since our main topic is saving energy, we focused on energy loss in toilets. This issue is both different and appropriate for the economic goal of the competition.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TEVFIK FIKRET'S DEATH ORKUN AYDINCILAR 11A

Not long ago, we commemorated the 107th anniversary of Tevfik Fikret's death. He undoubtedly carries a great importance in Turkish history. But what exactly made him so important to our culture and our values as the Turkish youth? Why was his death such an important loss?



Biography of Tevfik Fikret

Tevfik Fikret (24 December 1867 - 19 August 1915) was a Turkish poet and teacher. He was born in Kadırga, İstanbul. His father, Ahmet Ağa was a government official. His mother was a Greek immigrant whose father had converted to Islam. With the death of his mother and with his father's exile to Arabia, Tevfik Fikret was orphaned at the early age of 12. After these events, his grandmother and his aunt took him under their care..

He began his educational journey in a very conservative and traditional environment and, after his school was dedicated to immigrants who came to Istanbul from Thrace after the Russo-Turkish war, he continued his education at "Galatasaray Sultanisi". In this school, he was introduced to modern ideologies and he began forming his revolutionary identity. He also began writing poems while at high school. His first poem was featured in "Tercüman-i Hakikat" which was a daily newspaper published between 1878-1921.

After his graduation, he began working as a bureaucrat, but after a while, quit his job saying that he was disappointed by the fact that he was working very little for the money he received. Even after his resignation,, the state continued to pay him his overdue salaries which reached a large amount and which he ultimately took and donated to charity. This behavior made him a legend among the common folk by highlighting his honesty.

He continued to write poetry, publishing works at numerous periodicals such as "Mirsad", "Malumat", and "Servet-i Fünûn". Although he had published very important pieces of Turkish literature in each of these, "Servet-i Fünûn" is the publication that is the most related to the topic at hand.

During the decline of the Ottoman Empire, he was the leader of "Servet-i Fünûn", which was a magazine that embodied a movement in Turkish literature which was inspired by a modernized and Westernized way of creating literary work. This magazine also released certain articles related to modern lifestyles and innovations that were forming, mainly in the west. After the release of certain articles regarding the French Revolution, the magazine was ultimately censored and shut down.

After his sister's death, the exile of his like-minded friends and the termination of his lite-rary group, Tecfik Fikret began building a retirement home which he designed, next to the school named Robert College where he was now teaching. He called this place, "Aşiyan", which means home. He continued to keep his revolutionary mindset all his life until his death after a surgery. He was 47 years old.

It is clear that Tevfik Fikret was a revolutionary man with modern ideas that challenged the outdated and conservative ways of life in the Ottoman Empire. But why was his work specifically so important to our history? It is because he influenced many young minds who were also perceiving that the old state of things was not working like it used to and some things needed to change.

Tevfik Fikret's influence on Ataturk

Atatürk said that he took his spirit of revolution from Tevfik Fikret. By looking at Tevfik Fikret's life, it is obvious how Ataturk was inspired by Tevfik Fikret through his ideology.

For example, in 1901, Tevfik Fikret wrote a poem that criticised the state's incompetent rule, the corruption, the constant wars waged in the name of the Sultan Abdulhamid, called "Sis" (Mist). Upon reading this poem, revolutionaries all around the country felt the beginning of an uprising. This poem was one of the key elements that created the first sparks of a possible revolution.

Another poem, which greatly influenced Ataturk, was "Tarih-i Kadim". Ataturk said that this poem was the source of all the revolutions to be made. This is due to the fact that in this poem, Tevfik Fikret shows the reader the bitter realities of the Ottoman Empire. These realities were related to injustice, war, cruelty and corruption.

The great founder of the Turkish Republic also made several statements which were inspired by Tevfik Fikret quotes such as:

"There is only one thing we need, and that is hard work."

"All my hope is in the youth."

"The republic demands generations with free ideas, free conscience, and free wisdom."

Conclusion

The life of Tevfik Fikret is significant due to the fact that he was an outstanding figure who inspired many people, who, in their turn, were successful in liberating and rebuilding the Turkish nation, such as Ataturk with his modern ideas.

THE HISTORY OF CHRISTMAS

Although the real birth date of Jesus Christ is unclear, the 25th is universally accepted as the date of the religious day. But why is it the 25th? Since Christmas is a strictly Christian holiday unlike Halloween, it's not popularly celebrated in our country and other countries with smaller Christian populations. 2022 Nobel Prizes by Nehir Özcan 11A

The awarding of Nobel Prizes began in 1901 by an association founded by Alfred Nobel. They are annual prizes given to award its winners for their contributions to the public. It is awarded by separate establishments: The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences gives the awards in physics, chemistry and economics; The Karolinska Institute awards prizes in physiology or medicine, and The Norwegian Nobel Committee awards the literature prize.

The Nobel Prize in Physics 2022

-Alain Aspect, John F. Clauser, Anton Zeilinger have won the Nobel Prize in Physics for 2022.. Let's take a look at their work. They have studied quantum mechanics and won the prize with their hypothesis, research and experiments with entangled photons, demonstration of the perturbation of Bell inequalities, and pioneers in quantum information science.

The Nobel Prize in Chemistry 2022

-Carolyn R. Bertozzi of Stanford University in the USA, K. Barry Sharpless of the Scripps Research Institute, Morten Meldal of the University of Copenhagen in Denmark have been awarded for having asserted the idea of "click chemistry" by developing a new method known as directangular reactions. Bertozzi found a way for click chemistry to work within living organisms but without disturbing them. Such reactions are now used to recruit cells, monitor biological processes, and in the view of drugs to target diseases such as cancer.

The Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine 2022

Svante Paabo has been awarded for his study on the history of human genes. His study basically explained where we humans come from and how we are related to extinct hominins. He also found that gene transfer had occurred from these now extinct hominins to Homo Sapiens following the migration out of Africa around 70,000 years ago. This ancient flow of genes to present-day humans has physiological relevance today, for example affecting how our immune system reacts to infections.

The Nobel Prize in Literature 2022:

The Nobel prize in literature has been awarded to French author Annie Ernaux "for the courage and clinical acuity with which she uncovers the roots, estrangements and collective restraints of personal memory". Anders Olsson, chair of the Nobel committee, said that in her work, "Ernaux consistently and from different angles, examines a life marked by strong disparities regarding gender, language and class"

The Nobel Prize in Peace 2022:

The 2022 Peace Prize has been awarded to human rights advocate Ales Bialiatski from Belarus, the Russian human rights organisation Memorial and the Ukrainian human rights organisation Center for Civil Liberties.

There is a presentation of the Nobel prize which was given in 2022 on the first floor of our school if you may want to check it out..

THE NAME THAT COMES TO MIND WHEN YOU SAY PROPAGANDA:

Hitler wasn't alone when he exposed his horrific practices that affected the entire world. In fact, it was someone else; Joseph Goebbels, who planned it all.

Paul Joseph Goebbels was a German politician who served as the Minister of Public Enlightenment and Propaganda from 1933 to 1945. He was also the second chancellor of Nazi Germany. He was the master of lies who put Nazis brought power and supported Hitler behind the scenes with his propaganda methods. Have you ever heard the statement "If you tell a lie big enough and keep repeating it, people will eventually come to believe it."? If your answer is yes, you already know Goebbels. Goebbels was born in 1897 in Mönchengladbach. His father was a secretary in a factory. When he graduated from high school in 1917, he didn't get drafted because of his physical defects. He suffered from lung disease as a child, and his right foot was congenitally inverted and anatomically malformed. Because of these conditions, Goebbels was excused from military duties and was given desk jobs. In fact, Goebbels wanted to be a writer. He tried journalism. The most interesting characteristic of Goebbels was his deep loyalty to the idea of the 'Aryan race'. He was deeply attached to the ideology. He was so attached he failed to remember his own defects. He wasn't blond, and in addition to being quite short, he was a lame legged Catholic.

He officially enrolled in the Nazi party at the age of 27. Goebbels, who was a university graduate, was passionate about both reading and writing. He was afraid of all kinds of violence. He decided to follow the Nazi ideology and supported violence. After he joined the party, he started to hate everyone who was similar to himself.

He met Hitler in 1926. After a few hours of conversation, he became essential to his idol. Hitler had foreseen what Goebbels could do for the Nazi party, so he promoted him with an offer to lead the Berlin Nazi Organization which Goebbels gladly accepted.

He became the head of Nazi propaganda unit and he spread fear across Berlin. The violence that he hesitated became his best friend. He was so dominant that his name began to be mentioned right after Hitler in the Nazi party. Racism, hostility to immigrants...

You could find whatever one could fear in Goebbel's propaganda. Thanks to his literary abilities people listened to him for hours and his propaganda texts were effective. He took his place in the party government by making everyone believe in himself. Finally, he was authorized to direct all propaganda.

While his propaganda was getting more and more aggressive, Goebbels influence was rising in politics. "One nation, one state, one leader, great Germany!" As a cultured leader, he did everything to keep people illiterate. Radio was the most prevalent communica-

tion vehicle at the time; that's why Goebbels often talked about the importance of the radio. He often aired manipulative broadcasts. According to Goebbels; a lazy mind accepted propaganda more quickly. The more you repeat something, the more people will there be to believe it. And he thought that the public's mind should be kept busy.

The evil mind behind Hitler was Goebbels. He influenced millions of people with his terrible propaganda methods. He did everything to spread the nazism and unfortunately he was successful. And I think the terrifying propaganda methods that Goebbels used are still used today. This proves the great impact that Goebbels had on the world.

CGI in anime; Is This a Good Choice? by Mina Mercan Akçora 11B

People always search for things to entertain them in their free time. It can be a hobby, a book or an outdoor activity. For most, the best way to fill this time is to stay at home and watch a TV show or a movie. In addition, among these watchable media elements, there are also anime shows which are becoming popular in our country, especially in recent years. Moreover, this genre has such a passionate follower group that there is a term for people addicted to anime and manga: "otaku". A recent debate has divided this audience into two. Is 3D visualization a good design choice for anime? Why does CGI look pretty cheap and bad in a lot of series?

CGI (Computer Generated Imagery) is a new technology which allows us to use computer models and visual effects in the movies. It is a lot cheaper than traditional methods of making animated movies - drawing every scene by hand- and using CGI is the fastest way of finishing a project. The most prominent opinion among the anime lovers community on this subject is that 3D visuals are not the right choice. Even if we don't have enough CGI-based work to compare with the original 2D style anime, many people think that the bad examples we have now will multiply and won't improve in quality. Also, many of the examples they gave to support their views were actually popularized as manga, but ridiculed by anime adaptations made with CGI. One of the best examples of this is the Ex-Arm manga, which began to be published in 2015 and has its own fan base. Studio Visual Flight, which was put forward for the anime adaptation of the manga, actually had the potential to give life to Ex-Arms anime as a successful 3D anime. However, fans realized how poor the quality of the show would be as a 3D series. Even just by looking at the trailer they realized that the facial expressions of the characters and the ridiculous movements of the models would look pretty bad as 3D animations. Other elements of the list of anime that look bad because of CGI are as follows: Berserk(2016, walking animations), Vampire Holmes.

Even if there are people who argue that CGI is bad, it is also possible to encounter groups who argue the opposite and even the necessity of it. What these people say is that before we can decide whether a job is good or bad, we should give it time to develop. Examples they give to prove that CGI work is decent given enough time and budget are Dorohedoro, Beatstars, Hi Score Girl, and Land of the Lustrous. However, it is a fact that hybrid works that mix 2D and CGI are of better quality than works with only CGI content. For example; Ghost in the Shell 2: Innocence, Promare, Demon Slayer...

What determines whether CGI is good or bad? Lighting and harmony with the environment. Often, the reason for the bad look is that the CGI characters don't seem to belong to that world. Although they are computer models, the biggest reason for this is that when they cannot show their own depth on the screen and appear lifeless, the reason is usually the bland colors. If we are looking for a job that proves this thesis, we may come across Klaus, a children's cartoon on Netflix. Despite being 2D, they were able to show themselves in 3D with shading and light plays, and moreover, by applying the same lighting to the 3D objects they placed inside, they ensured that we could not select them in the environment. At the end, Klaus succeeded.

To sum up,CGI in anime is still fairly new and will certainly continue to evolve. That's why we should support developers who are trying to follow the process and bring innovations to the sector in this regard.

There will be four different committees; United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Committee (SOCHUM) and Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) and the agenda items to be discussed in each of them have been sent to the participants via email.

The purpose of this interview with Ms. Duygu Ünal is to help the students who will attend or plan to attend this conference to find answers to the question marks in their minds.

Q: What is MUN?

A: Shortly, MUN is a simulation of the United Nations. Students make discussions about worldwide problems and try to find solutions.

Q:What does attending MUN conferences add to the participants, what are the advantages for them? It gives students a new and different perspective for sure. How?

Firstly, since the official language of the conference is English, students have a chance to practice the language within a different environment. Speaking in front of a crowd can be a bit challenging for some, it is a good opportunity for many to overcome this fear.

In addition, as young ladies and gentlemen, students not only get more familiar with worldwide problems but also become a part of the possible solutions.

Last but not least, an MUN conference can be seen as a sociable environment as it is a natural opportunity for students to meet new friends.

Q:What topics are discussed at TFL MUN?

A: Our main topic is one of the most important problems of the world: Responsible Consumption and Production. Different committees will discuss the topic and try to find solutions.

Q:What awards can be received at the end of the conference, what are the differences?

A: At the end of the conference, we have three awards for each committee: BEST DELEGATE, OUTSTANDING DELEGATE and HONORABLE MENTION.

The delegate who makes the most contribution to the committee and shows the best performance during the discussions gets" the best delegate" award.

The delegate who performs efficiently in the committee gets an "outstanding performance" award.

The delegate who shows great efforts to participate in the discussions gets honorable mention.

Finally, I would like to express my own thoughts. The first conference I attended was a TFL MUN conference when I was in 8th grade. I had some difficulties on the first day as I didn't have a good grasp of what to do in general, but after I got used to the environment and its functioning, my second day was much more comfortable and enjoyable. Afterwards, I started to attend other conferences in Ankara individually. These conferences, which had more serious and strict rules, helped me develop my skills in expressing myself in another language, speaking in public, and meeting many different people. But none of these would have happened if I hadn't attended the conference at school. I think everyone should seize this opportunity, as the organization takes place in the school environment, with people you know. You would actually understand the nature of MUN conferences. I strongly believe it would help us be more comfortable and confident which we could make use of in the future.

Carl Olof Larsson is a Swedish painter who was born on May 28th 1853 and died on January 22th January 1919. He was a representative of the "Arts and Crafts" movement. He's mainly known for his use of water-colors and usually painted detailed drawings of family life. In his painting "Christmas Eve" we can also see a professional use of watercolor in details. In the painting we see a Christmas tradition taking place. A feast which is about to begin to celebrate Christmas and the new year with close relatives and friends. On the right we see a man who's probably the head of the house with his wife and daughter and on the left we can see guests gathering around the table, also a maid who's bringing in food. On the table, we see the traditional main course of a Christmas dinner; a turkey. Under the table there's also a cute detail which is a kitten waiting for its share of the dinner.
