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

Q- What has been your favorite MUN moment throughout your MUN career?

Selin: "Before TFLMUN'25 my favorite MUN moment was me earning the best delegate prize at MCMUN. It was unbelievable, I worked really hard and when I was recognized for my efforts I was very happy."

Here's the interview conducted with our co-chair of UNICEF, Doğa Karasu:

Q- What are you feeling about being the co-chair of 7th and 8th graders?

Doğa: "Doing MUN with the little ones wasn't as bad as we thought, in fact it was a lot of fun. I think our committee may have been more fruitful than the others, because it was the delegates' first time and they didn't know what to do. They had to listen and watch us attentively in order to learn. It was easier to control the committee since they were younger. I had so much fun. It was such an honor to explain the procedure to inexperienced people and see what they achieved thanks to our guidance. We couldn't have made it if the delegates didn't want to succeed."

Q- What was the most creative gossip you've ever received?

Doğa: "The most creative gossip I've ever received was 'Why are the chairs single? They are both gorgeous.' The answer is: we don't know."







Here's the interview we did with our chair of the Star Wars committee, Mehmet Doğu Çiftçi:

Q- What do you think about TFLMUN?

Doğu: "I have witnessed all three years of TFLMUN, twice as a delegate and this year as a chairboard member. What I appreciate about this organization is not just how great it is (although it truly is great); what I truly love about it is that it is a result of the resolve and determination of both the students who participate and our English teachers, especially Ms. Duygu Ünal who has tirelessly orchestrated this beautiful organisation with utmost care for three years. For this reason, I find it difficult to criticize, as I cannot overlook the immense effort put into the conference, with so many sacrificing their time and energy, while little is provided in terms of finances and logistics. Especially compared to some other organisations, I believe TFLMUN does not receive the care and support it truly deserves. It is an organisation that brings the school together near the end of the semester, it gives us joy and calms our mind after exhausting months."

Q- What do you think about the special committee?

Doğu: "Last year TFLMUN had its first special committee, simulating a showdown between prominent politicians and intellectuals in the aftermath of the declaration of the Republic of Türkiye. I was given the role İsmet İnönü and I had the chance to witness how much care and importance the organisation team and Ms. Duygu gave to that committee, as they did for this year's committee as well. In fact, this year's committee wasn't on the table until our USG, Eda Doğa Uğurdan, proposed the idea to Ms. Duygu. She reacted with excitement and interest, which also encouraged us to work for a good crisis committee.

For me, it was surprising because neither Cemre nor I had any prior crisis experience and only Eda did. It's truly fair to say that she ended up covering for our inexperience and supporting us, sometimes even positively acting like a "babysitter" to help us manage our committees during the conference.

It was a first, as a crisis committee, but was an amazing experience. I didn't feel like a chair but like a delegate myself. The delegates were so excited and proactive during the sessions that their energy swept me up, and I found myself caught up in the Galactic War, fighting alongside them. The committee also had a very funny ending, where we ended up capturing the Republican capital and they captured ours simultaneously. And from the chaos, Palpatine (who was actually Eda) initiated the Order 66 and we all died. Oops.



Q- Do you have any suggestions for improvement?

Doğu: "I believe TFLMUN has a great future but it as day passes the ability of seniors and teachers to sustain this effort goes lower. We need the other grades to lend their help and energy to keep the tradition going. Also, considering the growing economic hardships, that kind of extra help is totally necessary. TFLMUN is not just an MUN conference, you can always find that outside our school. It is not just any conference but two days of pure joy, excitement and fun for us highschoolers and even some 7th and 8th graders. We need TFL-MUN and TFLMUN needs the students."

Here's the interview conducted with our Secretary General Rüya Erdemir:

Q- What are your feelings and thoughts about this conference?

Rüya: "This year, since it was our last activity in high school, it was also our final MUN as students. Therefore, it was extra meaningful for us. We really put a lot of effort into the preparation phase, it wasn't just an ordinary MUN for us. We wanted everyone to have beautiful and long-lasting memories. We kept saying, 'Let's make this MUN different.' and it truly was. Especially as the academic team from the English department, including me, Selin Atilla, Tuna Kesen, Oğuzhan Sevinç, and Ms. Duygu, we were constantly having meetings. What really made this MUN different, in my opinion, was the outstanding success and quality of the organization. The organizing team, including IT, press, entertainment, etc., also worked hard. The entertainment team was constantly designing games. To make this year different, we organized a fashion show. In the end, after we hit our gavels at the closing ceremony on Sunday, delegates came up to us and said, 'This MUN was the best.' We received such great feedback and we really felt that we achieved our goal, which was the most important thing for us. The sponsorship shoots, the preparation phase, in short, everything we did created beautiful memories. There was nothing I disliked or criticized. I just wish it hadn't been so short. Everyone was so friendly, and our teamwork was amazing."

Q- What is your favorite gossip you've ever received so far?

Rüya: "In the 2023 TFLMUN held at school, I was representing the United States in the Health Committee. And all the crises were about America. There were two gossips in that committee: one said, 'Rüya will be triggered every time America is mentioned,' and the other said, 'America, stop drinking water.' I was so stressed during that conference that I was drinking water every 5 minutes. Whenever someone mentioned America in the GSL, everyone would turn and look at me, and I would be drinking water out of stress."

Q- What is your favorite MUN moment?

Rüya: "In this MUN, during the last session, Tuna and I visited each committee one by one. People congratulated us and thanked us for how well everything went. The UNICEF committee with the middle schoolers, in particular, came over to thank us as well. Those moments made me feel very proud and happy."

LOVE- Desiring the Impossible

Love is a really interesting emotion as it creates a form of relationship that everyone wants to achieve and considers almost impossible to find or maintain. In terms of these two aspects, I believe love is a form of pursuit and a source of sadness. It is a form of pursuit because it is thought that if there really is true love, no one and nothing can withstand its power. It is, however, a source of sadness too because everyone knows that true love is hard to find, and it is almost impossible. Then, one needs to ask himself/ herself: "Why are humans so eager to find true love if it makes them so upset? What is love and why is it so hard to achieve?"

Love is to desire to be with someone with all your heart and to lose yourself in that person. 'Losing the self in someone else' is a tricky condition for love. One may want to be with one's kin, friends, teachers, and so on. When love is at issue, however, wanting to be with someone seems like an inevitable desire. A loving person's only and true motivation is now that desire to the extent that he or she acts without considering the meaning beyond them. I think that ignoring or even forgetting the meaning of behaviours is the primary condition of love. That's why when worldly purposes become important in any relationship, love begins to fade away and disappears. Long-term relationships like marriage are so full of daily preoccupations that it is often acknowledged that it is not easy to maintain love in them, even if it started out as love.

Most of the famous authors believe that factors like daily routines, working life and money can disrupt true love. And if the relationship progresses without true love, it would have been a relationship with no soul where there aren't any emotional desires for one another. Some authors even argue that true love can only be preserved when lovers can't get together. Parallel to the latter, there is a strong Sufi tradition that associates the irreconcilable relationship between two people with true love, and in this way equates the only true love with that which is directed towards God. After a brief reflection, I may give examples like Tolstoy's *Anna Karenina and Flaubert's Madame Bovary for the former and* Orhan Pamuk's *Museum of Innocence for the latter. Ferhat and Şirin, Kerem and Aslı, Leyla and Mecnun* are the examples of Sufi tradition where human beings fell in love but never met.

So why can't humans stop chasing love? There may be several answers to this question. I think, however, that there are a few that are more prominent than the others. First of all, humans are social creatures and rather than staying alone, they prefer to spend time with people they love. They want others to be on their sides on special days like celebrations or even funerals. Surely, people may share their special occasions with their relatives. But a loved person signifies the loving person's life with almost all transcendental qualities.

Second of all, the ones in love usually cannot abandon love even if they want to. We can voluntarily separate ourselves from many of our habits and relationships. Love is, however, an involuntary and inevitable emotion. It is like a trick of God because we cannot know why and when it exactly happens and we cannot get rid of it even if we want to. It's almost like people were chosen by god to be couples and to be in love. Eros, the God of Love, probably lives among us and plays tricks on us.

Love is a really special quality that only humans have. It directs certain emotional actions towards somebody and there isn't any clear reasoning behind these actions. Reflection of Love in Literature and Cinema

Love has been one of the most universal and powerful emotions in human history and is a theme that has left deep marks in the arts. Love, one of the fundamental building blocks of human relationships, both individually and socially, has been reflected in different ways in every field of art. Literature and cinema are one of the most effective ways to explain and understand love.

The Relationship of Love with Literature

Similarly, modern films such as *La La Land* show that love can often be a dream and an ideal, and can clash with the practical realities of life.

The Universality of Love and Its Change Over Time

Literature and cinema also reflect the universality of love and how it has changed over time. Love has been defined and narrated in different ways in different periods of history, in line with social structures, norms and individual expectations. However, love has always remained as a theme belonging to the depths of the human soul and has created a universal language.

Especially in recent years, love has begun to be addressed in a more diverse and independent way in cinema and literature. Love narratives that go beyond traditional love stories and include cultural differences, different social classes, and originalities allow this emotion to be addressed in a more inclusive and multidimensional way.



Where THE Story of Love- "Romeo and Juliette"-Took Place: *Verona*

There have been countless art pieces made about love and such pieces will very likely continue to be created in the future, but ever since 1595, the date the unforgettable and iconic tragedy about a forbidden love; Romeo and Juliette was written, almost no other creation has had their name echo through minds for this long. And almost 4 centuries later, unbelievably the story is still relevant. Hence, in this text you'll read not only about this story but also about the story's location, a town in Italy and the impact of the tragic story on the culture and the fame of the place.

The Story (shortened):

In Verona, there are two families who have had a long standing feud, whose children happen to be the two youngsters with names Romeo and Juliet. Unaware of their families' enmity, at a party they see each other and fall in love. They instantly get married without telling anyone other than Juliet's nurse and Romeo's servant. Later on, Romeo's cousin gets into a fight which ends with his death. Romeo witnesses this crime and goes on to avenge his cousin. When he gets caught, they tell Romeo that he has to leave town or else they will kill him. Since leaving Verona means abandoning Juliet too, they spend their last night together. After Romeo leaves, still not knowing about her daughter's marriage, Juliet's mother says she's soon to get married to someone called Paris. Because Juliet doesn't want to marry someone else, she asks the priest who married Romeo and Juliet to come up with a plan to escape this marriage. He tells her to drink a potion to take her out, make her look as if she died the night of her marriage to Paris. Soon after her supposed death, Juliet is taken to her tomb in Verona where she'd meet Romeo. Later, when this plan is in action, someone who thinks Juliet has actually died tells Romeo his wife has passed away. When Romeo meets Juliet at her tomb, by his burden, he consumes poison to kill himself. Juliet, finding her husband dead, follows in her beloved husband's tragic footsteps, drinking the poison. After their death, their families find out about their children's relationship and make up even though it's all too late.



The Radix:

While we credit Shakespeare for creating such an immaculate story, the story's roots go further back. It was inspired by an Italian tale written by Matteo Bandello around 40 years prior, which was adapted into English by Arthur Brooke in 1562 called The Tragical History of Romeus and Juliet. However, Shakespeare's version, because of its poetic approach and story-telling style, helped this tragedy get universal recognition.

More about Verona:

Verona, one of the seven cities of Veneto, a part of Italy, in its northern area, is a stunning city and has gained historical significance and touristic attractions because of this famous story. It is also a UNESCO World Heritage Site due to its rich architectural and artistic belongings. Although Shakespeare never visited Verona, his depiction of the city is vivid and evocative, harmonizing its real-life charm with the romance of the story. Locations associated with Romeo and Juliet are being visited and celebrated every year by literature and history enthusiasts.

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Juliet's House in Verona (Casa di Giulietta) The House of Juliet in Verona is an imposing medieval palace, enormously rich in architectural history. Probably inhabited by the family of Dal Cappello since as early as the 13th century, it boasts a magnificently restored exposed brick façade with a Gothic portal and elegant three-lobed windows. The iconic balcony, assembled out of 14th-century marble elements, is representative of early 20th-century restoration trends. A balustrade connects the different parts of the house elegantly, while the courtyard contains a bronze statue of Juliet by Nereo Costantini. Carefully preserved, this Gothic residence is a major cultural landmark and a romantic symbol around the world.



San Francesco al Corso Convent Complex and Juliet's Tomb

The San Francesco al Corso Convent Complex consists of a medieval church and monastery, dating from the 13th century, which once hosted a Franciscan monastic community. Antonio Avena transformed it in 1935 into Juliet's Tomb, one of Verona's popular tourist attractions. The annexed Museum of Frescoes "G.B. Cavalcaselle" opened in 1973; it displays fresco cycles coming from medieval and Renaissance buildings in Verona, along with sculptures from the 19th century. The Guarienti Room reconstructs a 16th century Veronese palace interior, featuring illusionistic frescoes and Ionic columns that create an open loggia effect. The crypt preserves Juliet's legendary sarcophagus, while the cloister houses medieval and Roman stone artifacts.



Piazza Erbe

Piazza Erbe is the historical heart of Verona, featuring all the traces of the city's architectural evolution, which earned it a place on UNESCO's World Heritage list. The square melts together Roman, medieval, and Renaissance styles, surrounded by the ancient buildings of different ages. On the north side, it houses the Lamberti Tower, the Casa dei Giudici, and the Mazzanti houses, which are famous for their well-preserved frescoes, they all reflect the nickname of Verona: Urbs Picta-painted city. The west side is dominated by Palazzo Maffei, a baroque masterpiece that's adorned with mythological statues. Farther south, the House of Merchants is one of the most striking medieval structures. A Roman fountain, the Madonna Verona, provides the centerpiece, flanked by the 13th-century Tribune and the Column of San Marco, which recalls Verona's days under Venetian rule.

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Roman Amphitheatre

Dominating Piazza Bra, the Roman Amphitheatre was an engineering marvel when built in the 1st century A.D. It can boast an elliptical shape that ensures excellent acoustics and holds a lot of spectators. Constructed by perfectly cut marble blocks, in the past, gladiators and public performances took place here. Nowadays, it is still a famous opera arena and one of the best-preserved Roman arenas in Italy.

Castelvecchio Bridge (Scaliger Bridge)

The bold Scaliger Bridge was constructed across the Adige as an escape route from Verona between 1354 and 1356 and is one of the most daring medieval constructions. With three large arches- the largest about 50 meters in span- and made out of red terracotta brick and white marble, the bridge rebuild from 1951 resembles its original version, which was destroyed in 1945. The military function of the bridge is underscored by battlements, trenches, and high towers.



Scaliger Tombs

The Scaliger Tombs is a striking example of a Gothic funerary complex: sarcophagi for the ruling family of Verona, the Della Scala, within a wrought iron fence decorated with their trademark staircase motif. The ark of Cangrande I (14th century) is attributed to the same architect who designed Sant'Anastasia Church and features a Gothic tabernacle, religious reliefs, and an equestrian statue, originally housed in Castelvecchio. The ark of Mastino II is dated back to 1345, a Gothic form combined with painting and gilding; that of Cansignorio of 1375 is the most sumptuous, covered in sculptures by Bonino da Campione of holy warriors and biblical figures.



Artifacts and Art related to Romeo and Juliet

Fascinating artifacts reflecting the city's legacy in literature and history are also kept in Verona. The Civic Museum of Verona contains Renaissance art reminiscent of the era of Shakespeare's play, while Juliet's House contains letters, costumes, and art inspired by the love story. To this day, visitors make use of the courtyard walls of Juliet's house to leave love notes on-a modern-day tradition inspired by the tale.

Conclusion

Verona is not only the setting of *Romeo and Juliet*, but it's a city where history, art, and literature become one. Its ancient streets, stunning architecture, and timeless association with Shakespeare's masterpiece make it a must-see for anyone moved by the power of love and stories.
